TODAY'S READINGS ALL carry reference to the central theme of forgiveness and the importance of showing God's mercy to others in order to receive it ourselves.

In the Gospel, Jesus uses the parable of the unforgiving servant to teach of the need to always forgive our neighnbour. We hear today about a man who pleads for forgiveness but is unwavering in his refusal to grant the same. This ironic tale showing the hypocrisy of society aptly presents both the power and difficulty of forgiveness. As recited in the Lord's Prayer and detailed in the readings of today's Mass, we are challenged to demostrate our desire for God's unconditional love and compassion through our practice of the Golden Rule each day.

We are reminded in today's Gospel how new life through forgiveness far outweighs the cost of any debt owed. Yet, just as the king's remission of the servant's debt mirrors God's invaluable and boundless grace, we, too, must never overlook our calling and responsibility to model the same to each of our brothers and sisters in Christ.

For as we will one day be judged based on our life's body of work as testament of our faith, let us always seek to reflect Jesus' love by modelling His forgiving mercy in both words and deeds. (Reflection of Matt Charbonneau of Living with Christ)

Dear Parishioners:

I must admit, even though numbers are less, that it is good to be able to celebrate Mass, daily, and on Sundays, again in our church. I know that many churches, during this time of COVID-19 have been essentially watching Mass on the internet, not only from parishes that provide a link, but especially the daily Mass from the Cathedral-Basilica with Cardinal Collins. The Archbishop has seen this as his way of being out front and evangelizing the faithful people of our Archdiocese, and beyond.

It is clear that many people miss attending Mass in person at their parishes. For some, their age, and health, are a concern. For others, they are simply concerned about not knowing what to expect. This sense of anxiety is understandable. I try to be conscious, when celebrating Mass, to speak to those who are watching virtually. I cannot tell you how many emails and letters we get to say how much people appreciate being able to connect to their home parish, even though other options are available. While they can offer the Prayer for a Spiritual Communion at each Mass, they long for the day they can receive it for themselves. This "hunger" and desire for the Lord, in the sacraments, is something truly inspiring and causes us to reflect more deeply on the importance of our church, especially in times of great need.

As an example, a few weeks ago, I reached out to one of our oldest parishioners, aged 95, who, in the past, never missed Mass on a Sunday. He would take Wheel Trans, had a walker, and was always the first at the door when I opened for Mass. He has not been able to attend Mass since the initial closing of churches almost five months ago. In our phone conversation, I realized he needed the strength of the Eucharist and so I arranged, with social distancing guidelines, to bring him the Eucharist. I also brought my seminarian-intern with me.

I was surprised, when we arrived, to find him already sitting on his front porch, in a rocking chair, saying his rosary, his mask firmly in place. He looked at my seminarian, Fraser, and told him that he recognized him from our virtual Masses. He said, "You will be a good priest, and I promise to pray for you." Fraser was inspired by his words and his example of faith, marveling at how strong he was, even at 95 years old, and still intimately connected to the Lord. Following our visit, I could tell this would be a memory that would remain with the seminarian for a long time. The man's grateful words would also remain with him: "Thank you for bringing me Jesus."

I particularly pray for the day we can all return to the sacraments in great numbers. I pray for a vaccine (and I encourage you to do the same). In the meantime, let us not give up hope, but appreciate that God is still very much with us, in all that we do, and in the many ways, we see him in the church, and in one another, every day.

Yes, not even a pandemic can separate us from God. We just need to look closer at how He is present, in so many ways. For me, that man on the porch was a moment of God's grace.

In conclusion, I leave you with a scripture passage, taken from St. Paul to the Romans (8.35,37-39), which I trust may be of inspiration to you during this time of pandemic.

"Brothers and sisters: Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor Angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."
