

## DOUBTING DISCIPLE



Last week we heard the Good News about how Jesus died on the cross and then rose from the dead. Several people, including most of the disciples, saw the risen Jesus. But there was one disciple who would not believe these reports. His name was Thomas.

"That Thomas, what a doubter," one of the disciples said. "We all told him we had seen the Lord, but he wouldn't listen to us. He told us, 'I will never believe it without probing the nailprints in his hands, without putting my finger in the nailmarks and my hand into his side."



How did they finally convince Thomas?

Well, actually, they didn't. Instead, Jesus appeared to the disciples when Thomas was among them. He told Thomas to check out his wounds.

Did Thomas do what the Lord asked?

No way! Once he saw Jesus standing there, he knew the truth right away. He didn't need any more proof. People of faith don't need proof. Believing without seeing is what faith is all about.



## Doubt It"

This is a fun game that will help the class or family see how much they know about lesus' life. Here's how it goes:


One person needs to be the scorekeeper as well as a player. When keeping score, the scorekeeper should have one column that reads "correct" and another that reads "incorrect." The object of the game is for the group to get as many marks in the "correct" column as possible.

Each person playing should have a little fact, tidbit, or story about the life, death, or resurrection of lesus. The information can be true or false. If it's true, the person should be able to point out the Bible chapter and verse where the information can be found.

To begin the game, each person should make their statement about Jesus one at a time. After the statement is made, the rest of the people playing should vote on whether they think the fact is true or if they "doubt it."

For example, Gena says: "Caiphas was a man who rescued Jesus from serpents when Jesus was little." Those who think that's true should vote "yes" while those who doubt it should vote "no." After the vote is taken, Gena says, "It's false. That never happened." If most people were wrong, a mark goes in the "incorrect" column. If most people were right, the mark goes in the "correct" column.

In this game, everyone works on being a winner together!



# Family Fage

The happiness of the apostles upon seeing Jesus again can be seen as a reflection of the joy we all feel when we are reunited with people we love. Too often we forget how important people are to us until they are no

longer near us. This week, make it a special point to let those who are part of your daily lives know how much you love their company.

Gather the family to talk about the important people in your lives. Make two lists: one of people you see every day but forget to appreciate (especially the members of the family) and one of people who are important to you but live far away.

Plan a "reunion" celebration including all those people on the first list. Write a special tribute to all those people on the list, telling them how wonderful you feel that you can be together with them, how much you love them, and mention their special gifts to you. These tributes can be read at your celebration.



Make a PEACE and LOVE banner. Write the words PEACE and LOVE in large colorful letters on your banner, then add the names of the people from both your lists.


